


Mutual Respect and Tolerance

Protected Characteristics


A belief is something that affects our life choices and the way we live. Our gifts, talents and interests can influence our beliefs. We should never be treated unfairly because of our beliefs.

Speaking and Listening

Birth to 5 Matters: Listens and responds to ideas expressed by others in conversation or discussion. Shows confidence in speaking to others about their own needs, wants, interests and opinions in a familiar group.

Writing

Can you write a poster to encourage people to come and watch your circus performance?

Birth to 5 Matters: Gives meaning to the marks they make as they draw and write. Begins to make letter-type shapes to represent the initial sound of their name and other familiar words. Starts to develop their phonic knowledge by linking sounds to letters.

Discuss that once your show is ready to perform, you need an audience to watch it. One way of letting people know about the circus and encouraging them to come and watch is to make and put up some posters.

Think about: What day will your performance be on? What time will the show start? What acts will you show? Juggling, balancing, something else? Where will you put your posters?

Resources: Circus poster proforma (see EY Resource 1), pencils, sound mats

Construction

Can you build the tallest tower?

Birth to 5 Matters: Uses various construction materials, e.g. joining pieces, stacking vertically. Enjoys tackling problems involving prediction and discussion of comparisons of length.

Discuss that a lot of the world records achieved are about who can make the biggest of something e.g., the biggest doughnut, the tallest dog. Set the children the challenge of building the tallest tower in the class.

Think about: What will you use to build your tower? How tall do you want to make it? Will you make it on your own or work with a friend? Can you compare your tower to a friend's? How many blocks have you used to build your tower?

Resources: Different construction materials such as Duplo, wooden blocks, large construction blocks

Role-play Circus

Can you take on roles in a circus?

Birth to 5 Matters: Uses language to imagine and recreate roles and experiences in play situations. Relook at this week's poster and discuss all the other equipment you can see. Look at the word 'circus'.

Think about: What is a circus? What do circus performers do? How could we make our own circus? What do we need?

What acts will we perform? Can you practise the acts you want to perform such as juggling, balancing, gymnastics?

Resources: Balls (different sizes), bikes, scooters, hoops, balance beams, musical instruments, stage area, chairs, a parachute could be used to resemble a big top tent

Maths

Can you take on some 1-minute challenges?

Birth to 5 Matters: Beginning to experience measuring time with timers. Counts out up to 10 objects.

When Simeon completed his juggling challenges, he had to achieve as many juggling catches as he could in 1 minute. Show the children a 1-minute egg timer and watch the timer from start to finish to show how long 1 minute is. Talk the children through some challenges you would like them to do in 1 minute. Use the challenges on **EY Resource 2** or make up some of your own.

Think about: How many beads do you think you will be able to thread on this string in 1 minute? How many did you thread on? How do you know? Would you like to try the challenge again? Do you think you will be able to do more this time? How many would you like to thread on? What other challenge would you like to try? How many times do you think you will be able to do this in 1 minute? Did you achieve more or fewer than the last challenge? Why do you think this is?

Resources: 1-minute egg timers, challenge cards (see EY Resource 2), paper, pencils, threading beads and laces
