




What should the signs say around the construction site?

School is a place where we can learn about our diverse world. It is also a place where we can feel safe to be who we want to be.






















UN Rights of a Child

Speaking and Listening

Birth to 5 Matters: Shows confidence in speaking to others about their own needs, wants, interests and opinions in a familiar group. Shows interest in the lives of people who are familiar to them.

What can you see? What do you like or dislike about this picture? Where do you think this picture has been taken? What do you think might be happening in this week's story?

Writing

Can you write a sign for your construction site?

Birth to 5 Matters: Gives meaning to the marks they make as they draw and write. Begins to make letter-type shapes to represent the initial sound of their name and other familiar words. Starts to develop their phonic knowledge by linking sounds to letters.

Discuss that building sites can be dangerous places. People at building sites wear hard hats to protect their heads and hi-vis vests so they can be easily seen. All building sites have signs around them to warn people that it is a dangerous place and to keep out.

Think about: What will you write on your sign? Why do you think building sites are dangerous places? Do you think the signs will help to keep people safe? How? Now that you have written your sign, can you read back your writing?

Resources: Drawing and writing proforma (see EY Resource 1), pencils, sound mats

Outdoor Construction Site

Can you set up your own construction site?

Birth to 5 Matters: Uses language to imagine and recreate roles and experiences in play situations.

Think about: What needs doing on this building site today? What will you build? What will you use to build it? Will this building have windows/doors/a roof?

What needs to be done first? How will you make sure this building is safe? Will it go through any safety checks?

Resources: Large role-play construction bricks/blocks, tyres, cones, wooden planks, hard hats, hi-vis vests, wheelbarrow, spades, buckets, clipboards, paper, pencils

Sand Small World Role-play

Can you make up stories using diggers and dumpers?

Birth to 5 Matters: Plays cooperatively as part of a group to create, develop and act out an imaginary idea or narrative.

Before buildings are built, diggers and dumpers come in to get the land ready.

Think about: I wonder what the diggers and dumpers need to do today! Is there much work to be done? I hope nothing goes wrong! Where do the dumpers tip their load?

Resources: Sandpit, sand, small world diggers and dumpers, small world people, traffic cones, stones

Maths/Playdough

Can you explore the different building blocks?

Birth to 5 Matters: Matches the numeral with a group of items to show how many there are (up to 10). Counts up to five items, recognising that the last number said represents the total counted so far.

Discuss that when builders build houses, there is a lot of counting involved. They need to know how many bricks they need and building blocks and bricks can be different sizes. Model pressing in building bricks into playdough.

Think about: Can you press the different building blocks into the playdough? Which has left the biggest print? Which has left the smallest? Can you count how many circles you can see in the print the building block has left? Can you match the number of circles in each print to a number?

Resources: Playdough, small building blocks, playdough tools, numbered and unnumbered images of building blocks (see EY Resource 2)
