Have a strategic approach to improving attendance for the whole area and make it a key focus of all frontline council services.
Notify the school as soon as possible when their child has to be unexpectedly absent (e.g. sickness). Only request leave of absence in exceptional circumstances and do so in advance. Book any medical appointments around the school day where possible.	Develop and maintain a whole school culture that promotes the benefits of good attendance. Accurately complete admission and attendance registers. Have robust daily processes to follow up absence. Have a dedicated senior leader with overall responsibility for championing and improving attendance.	Ensure school leaders fulfil expectations and statutory duties. Have a School Attendance Support Team that works with all schools in their area to remove area-wide barriers to attendance. Provide each school with a named point of contact in the School Attendance Support Team who can support with queries and advice. 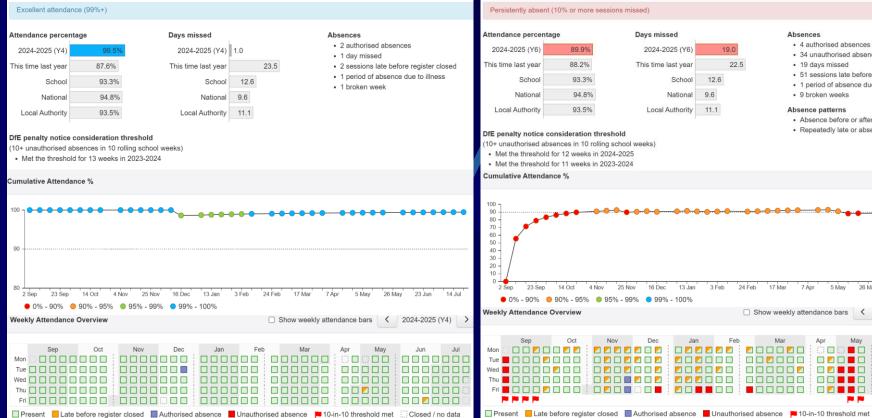

End of Year Expectations for Year 4

This booklet provides information for parents and carers on the end of year expectations for children in our school. The National Curriculum outlines these expectations as being the <u>minimum</u> requirements your child must meet in order to ensure continued progress.

All the objectives will be worked on throughout the year and will be the focus of direct teaching. Any extra support you can provide in helping your children to achieve these is greatly valued and will help them to reach their full potential.

If you have any queries regarding the content of this booklet or want support in knowing how best to help your child, please talk to the class teacher.



Reading

- Give a personal point of view on a text.
- Re-explain a text with confidence.
- Justify inferences with evidence, predicting what might happen from details stated or implied.
- Use appropriate voices for characters within a story.
- Recognise apostrophe of possession (plural)
- Identify how sentence type can be changed by altering word order, tenses, adding/deleting words or amending punctuation.
- Explain why a writer has used different sentence types or a particular word order and the effect it has created.
- Skim & scan to locate information and/or answer St a question.



How to help your child with Reading

- Read with your child daily.
- Make a note in your child's reading record every time you have read with them.
- Make a note if your child is struggling with a particular book or is not enjoying the book.
- Ask them questions or ask them to summarise a page or chapter in their own words.

E.g. Summarise this chapter in exactly 20 words.

Can you tell me why.....

Encourage your child to use 'because' when giving an opinion.



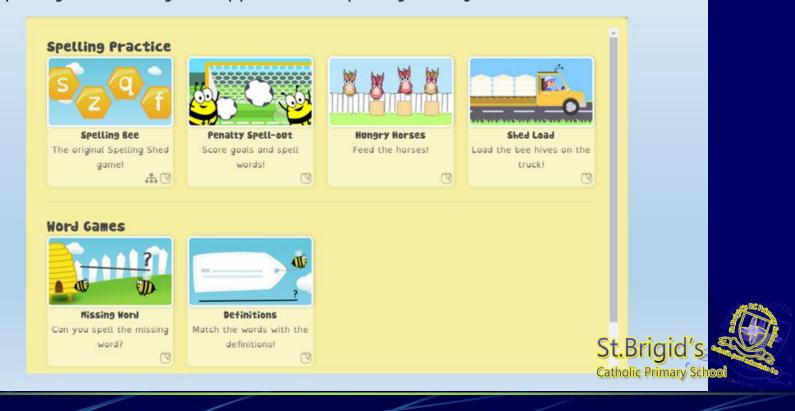
Writing

- Vary sentence structure, using different openers.
- Use adjectival phrases (e.g. biting cold wind).
- · Use appropriate choice of noun or pronoun.
- Use fronted adverbials.
- Use apostrophe for plural possession.
- Use a comma after fronted adverbial (e.g. Later that day, I heard bad news.).
- Use commas to mark clauses.
- Use inverted commas and other punctuation to punctuate direct speech.
- Use paragraphs to organised ideas around a theme.
- Use connecting adverbs to link paragraphs.
- Write with increasing legibility, consistency and fluency.



How to help your child with Writing

- Encourage children to keep diaries, write comic strips etc.
- Spelling Shed is a great app to make spelling more fun.



Mathematics

- Count backwards through zero to include negative numbers.
- Compare and order numbers beyond 1,000.
- Compare and order numbers with up to 2 decimal places.
- Read Roman numerals to 100.
- Find 1,000 more/less than a given number.
- Count in multiples of 6, 7, 9, 25 and 1000.
- Recall and use multiplication and division facts all tables to 12x12.
- · Recognise PV of any 4-digit number.
- Round any number to the nearest 10, 100 or 1,000.
- Round decimals with 1dp to nearest whole number.
- Add and subtract numbers with up to 4-digits using written columnar method.
- Multiply:
 - o 2-digit by 1-digit
 - o 3-digit by 1-digit
- · Count up/down in hundredths.
- Recognise and write equivalent fractions
- Add and subtract fractions with same denominator.
- Read, write and convert time between analogue and digital
 12 and 24 hour clocks.



How to help your child with Mathematics

- Weekly homework is set on website/app called Education City (children have this login in their reading record). This is set on a Friday and due in before the next Friday. This is differentiated and can be adjusted so please let me know if your child is struggling or finding it too easy.
- Practise telling the time.
- Practise times tables on the way to school/shops
- Times table objectives:

Year 4 Multiplication Check

- First three weeks in June 2026.
- 25 random questions (up to 12 x 12) where children will have 6 seconds to answer each question.
- Completed on iPad or laptops.
- No pass mark as children are expected to know all their tables by the end of Year 4.
- Results will be shared with parents and used to inform teaching in Year 5 and 6.



Relationships and Health Education

Relationships and Health Education (revised Sept 2020) is a compulsory part of the school curriculum, which comprises two distinct areas:

- Relationships
- Physical health and mental wellbeing

Our curriculum is designed to be:

- Appropriate for your child's age and development stage.
- Sensitive to the needs and religious backgrounds of the children in our school.

The Relationships part of the curriculum will teach the children what they need to learn to build positive and safe relationships:

- With family.
- With friends.
- Online.

Our school will teach in a way that is appropriate to your child's age and will look at these questions:

- What is a relationship?
- 🌒 What is friendship?
- What is family?
- Who can your child look to for support?



RSE forms a part of the PSHE, RE and Science Curriculum.

Our key objective is the well-being of the children. We believe parents are the prime educators of their children

The school, church and family will work together; our role as a school is to support you and not to replace you

Parents have the right to withdraw their children from **elements** of RSE education. If you wish to do so, please contact Mrs Tyler.

Sex education is separate from the Relationships and Health curriculum.

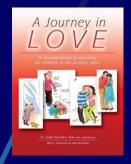
You <u>can</u> withdraw your child from some or all of the lessons on Sex Education. The head teacher must grant your request to withdraw your child.

But before making a request, please:

 Remember that the Science curriculum in all maintained schools includes content on human development, which includes human reproduction. There is no right for a parent to withdraw their child

from the science curriculum.

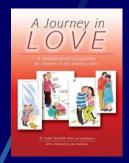

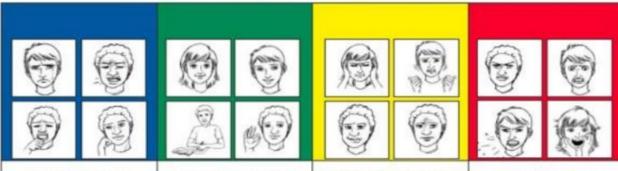

Mental Health & Well-being Zones of Regulation

The **ZONES** of Regulation®



BLUE ZONE

Sad Sick Tired Bored Moving Slowly

GREEN ZONE

Calm
Feeling Okay
Focused
Ready to Learn

YELLOW ZONE

Frustrated
Worried
Silly/Wiggly
Excited
Loss of Some Control

RED ZONE

Mad/Angry Terrified Yelling/Hitting Elated Out of Control



Key points:

- There is no 'bad' Zone.
- Everyone experiences all of the Zones at different times and in different circumstances.
- We can't change the way children feel BUT we can help them manage their feelings/states and behaviours. "It's OK to be angry but it is not OK to hit..."
- You can be in more than one Zone at a time (eg. sad and angry)
- If your child is in the Red Zone...
- Limit verbals this is not a teachable moment.
- Discuss use of tools when child is regulated.
- Plan for if/when child is in Red Zone. "I wonder if this strategy would help...?

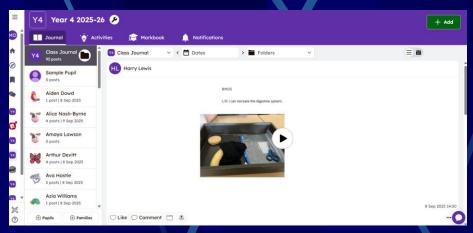
